Submission Guidelines

Designs wanted : JF Original Furoshiki Design

- Design theme : Designs should evoke a fusion of the United States and Japan.
 - Eligibility : Entry is open to individuals or groups engaged in the study of design or related subjects at a university or vocational school and residing in the United States. (Students of any nationality are welcome to enter the contest.)
 - Awards : After the entries are judged, the following prizes will be awarded:
 - 1 grand prize
 - 3 prizes for excellence
 - 10 prizes for merit

The grand prize winner will receive ¥100,000, which includes a ¥30,000 royalty payment covering two years. The winners of prizes for excellence will each receive a ¥30,000 royalty payment, also covering two years.
